



### The Covenant of Mutual Ministry

Parishioners of Church of Our Redeemer stand in body or in spirit as the Rector and Wardens gather facing the Bishop, who reads a charge to the parish.

Bishop:

Good people of Church of Our Redeemer, through Baptism you have been adopted into the community of faith, God's holy fellowship, the Body of Christ, the Church. Together with your rector, you have been called to share in the Church's mission to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ.

As your bishop, I remind you that in Baptism, you are fully empowered and authorized to exercise ministry in Christ's name, with mutual affection and respect, within this parish, in the Diocese of Massachusetts, and in the wider community. Having covenanted in Baptism to do this work, remember that each of you has resources and gifts for ministry. Join your rector, in prayer, in discerning a vision for this parish, and in calling forth the leadership, resources, and talents to carry out that vision.

As you love and serve God's people, remember to love, support, and nourish your rector, her family, and the members of the staff who serve you here.

Do you commit yourselves to this task?

People: We do, by the grace of God.

Bishop: May the One who has given you the will to do these things, give you the grace and power to perform them.

Megan, Presbyter of the Church of God, you have been called to work together with your Bishop and fellow Presbyters as a pastor, priest, and teacher, and to take your share in the councils of the Church. Now, in accordance with the Canons, you have been called to serve God in Christ at Church of Our Redeemer, in the town of Lexington, in the Diocese of Massachusetts. This letter is a sign that you are fully empowered and authorized to exercise this ministry, accepting its privileges and responsibilities as a priest of this Diocese, in communion with your Bishop. Having committed yourself to this work, do not forget the trust of those who have chosen you. Care alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. By your words and in your life, proclaim the Gospel. Love and serve

Christ's people. Nourish them, empower them for ministry, and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come.

Bishop: Do you commit yourself to this trust and responsibility?

Rector: I do, by the grace of God.

Bishop: May the One who has given you the will to do these things, give you

the grace and power to perform them.

Parishioners of Church of Our Redeemer are seated.

Diocesan clergy, members of neighboring congregations, and members of the local community stand in body or in spirit.

Bishop: Will you members of the local community and the wider church, who

witness this new beginning, support, and uphold the priest and

people of this congregation in their ministry together?

People: We will, by the grace of God.

### The Exchange of Gifts

Bishop: Holy Scripture records that when God and God's people enter into a

covenant with each other, God establishes a sign to mark the new relationship. When a priest and people enter into a new covenant with one another, the exchange of symbolic gifts is an appropriate

way to mark the occasion.

The Bishop presents the new Rector with a vessel of water, saying:

Megan, receive this water and help me baptize in obedience to our

Lord.

People: Amen.

The Rector and Wardens present a lighted candle to the Bishop, saying:

Bishop Gates, receive this candle as a sign of our commitment to work with the rest of our diocese in spreading the light of Christ to all

people.

People: Amen.

Worship leaders, representing the Acolytes, Altar Guild, Choir, Liturgy Team, and Tech Team present Rev. Megan with a red stole, bread, and wine saying:

Megan, receive this stole, bread, and wine and be among us as a pastor and priest.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents the worship leaders with a Book of Common Prayer and a Hymnal, saying:

Receive this Book of Common Prayer and Hymnal as a sign of our shared commitment to shape and lead worship that, through music, word, and ritual, opens the word of God to those gathered and brings them to a greater awareness of God's presence in their lives and in our world.

People: Amen.

Members of the Atrium and Youth Group present Rev. Megan with a Youth Group Sweatshirt, saying:

Megan, receive this sweatshirt and be among us as a companion, teacher, and mentor.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents a Bible and other books to representatives of Redeemer's Bible study and Adult Formation, saying:

On behalf of all the learners in this community, receive this Bible and these books as a sign of our shared commitment to help each other study, learn, and explore throughout our lives so that we might understand more fully who God is and how God moves in our world, and draw ever closer to God.

People: Amen.

Members of the Pastoral Care Team present Rev. Megan with a prayer shawl made by the Redeeming Knitters, saying:

Megan, receive this prayer shawl, and join us in our ministry of caring for those who suffer from loneliness, illness, grief, or trouble.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents a home communion set to a member of the Pastoral Care Team, saying:

Receive this home communion set and help us extend the sacrament of the altar to those who cannot be physically present here.

People: Amen.

Members of the Social Action Committee present Rev. Megan with work gloves, saying:

Receive these gloves and join in our ministry of serving God's people and God's creation.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents representatives of the Social Action Committee with a basket of food, saying:

Receive this basket of food as a symbol of our commitment to share with those whom God has called us to serve, both in this community and beyond.

People: Amen.

Representatives of the Property, Finance, and Stewardship Committees present Megan with a copy of the Gantt chart and budgeting materials, saying:

Receive these worksheets and join us in the stewardship of resources entrusted to this community for the aid and support of all our ministries.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents representatives of the Property, Finance, and Stewardship Committees with a toolbox saying:

Receive this toolbox as a sign of our shared commitment to tend to the resources of our parish that they may facilitate all we do in the name of Jesus.

People: Amen.

The Regional Canon for the Central Region and the Dean of Alewife Deanery present the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Massachusetts to Rev. Megan saying:

Megan, obey these Canons and be among us to share in the councils of this Diocese.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents representatives of the Clericus of the Diocese of Massachusetts with Anglican prayer beads, saying:

Receive these Anglican prayer beads as a sign of my commitment to be in relationship with my fellow clergy and to support each other and the broader ministry of the church through prayer, presence, counsel, and encouragement.

People: Amen.

The Wardens present Rev. Megan with keys to the church, saying:

Receive these keys and let the doors of this place be open to all of God's people.

People: Amen.

Rev. Megan presents a representation of an icon to the Wardens, saying:

On behalf of Church of Our Redeemer, receive this image of The Trinity In Community as a symbol of an icon to be commissioned and written for Church of Our Redeemer. May it be for us a reminder that all we do in and through and within and beyond this community, we do in the name of our Triune God who continually calls us into community with each other, and with God.

People: Amen.

Bishop: Let all these things be a sign of the ministry in this place.

People: Amen.

The congregation remains seated as the new rector prays:

Holy and loving God, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof; yet you have called your servant to stand in your house, and to serve at your altar. To you and to your service I devote myself, body, soul, and spirit. Fill my memory with the record of your mighty works; enlighten my understanding with the light of your Holy Spirit; and may all the desires of my heart and will center in what you would have me do. Make me an instrument of your salvation for the people entrusted to my care, and grant that I may faithfully administer your holy Sacraments, and by my life and teaching set forth your true and living Word. Be always with me in carrying out the duties of my ministry. In prayer, quicken my devotion; in praises, heighten my love and gratitude; in preaching, give me readiness of thought and expression; and grant that, by the clearness and brightness of your holy Word, all the world may be drawn into your blessed kingdom. All this I ask for the sake of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**



Presider:

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory.

Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life. On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given

thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

All: Christ has died.

Christ has risen.

Christ will come again.

Presider:

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever.

### **The Holy Communion**

All who come seeking God are welcome to receive Communion. If you have difficulty coming forward, please tell a greeter that you would like Communion brought to your seat.

Ushers will direct the congregation to the nearest Communion station. Communion will be brought to those sitting in the balcony and Great Hall. If you would like a gluten-free wafer, simply let the priest know. Both bread and wine are offered, but we affirm the long tradition of the church that to receive one element alone is to receive the sacrament fully. Intinction (dipping the bread in the wine) is not permitted in accordance with diocesan guidelines. If you prefer to receive a blessing rather than the bread and wine, please come forward, cross your arms across your chest and the clergy will gladly offer a blessing.

If you are worshiping at home and not able to come to church for Communion, you are invited to offer this prayer:

### **Prayer for Spiritual Communion**

In union, blessed Jesus, with the faithful gathered at every altar of your Church where the Holy Eucharist is able to be celebrated, and especially with all those in this Diocese and in the Redeemer community who, for the sake of health and wholeness, cannot gather at this time, we desire to offer you praise and thanksgiving. We remember your death, Lord Christ; we proclaim your resurrection; we await your coming in glory. Since we cannot receive you today in the Sacrament of your Body and Blood, we beseech you to come spiritually into our hearts. Cleanse and strengthen us with your grace, Lord Jesus, and let us never be separated from you. May we live in you, and you in us, in this life and in the life to come. Amen.


